- Mice have supersonic hearing—and can use ultrasound for communication
- Cats use meows only to communicate with humans, not with each other
- Mice are like tiny acrobats—they can walk along very thin pieces of rope or wire
- Most cats live 12-20 years: but one very long-lived puss called Crème Puff lived to the ripe old age of 38
- Mice eat about 15-20 times a day




STORY STARTER AND WRITING ACTIVITIES







How to make a Cat from Sculpey clay

You will need white, caramel and black Sculpey clay.

Two beads.

A cocktail stick or modeling tools if you have them.



Take the middle-sized ball of caramel coloured clay to make the cat's head.

Use two of the smaller balls to make the ears.



Flatten the clay to make an ear shape.

Use a flattened white ball of clay to make the inside of the ear.



Shape your ears into the shape you want and attach to the cat's head.

Take a white ball of clay to make the cat's muzzle.



Flatten the clay and use the cocktail stick to cut away a wedge at the top end.



Attach the white clay where the cat's muzzle would be.

Mark the clay where you want the eyes to be.



Use the cocktail stick to help position the bead eyes.



Take a black ball of clay and shape it into a little heart.

This will make the cat's nose.



Position the nose and make nostril holes with the cocktail stick.

You can make marks for whiskers and a mouth.

Take the large ball of clay to make the cat's body.



Shape the caramel clay ball into a short oblong.

Flatten a white ball of clay to make the tummy fur.



Attach the white clay to make the tummy fur.



Use the smaller clay balls to make the cat's back legs.




Two more balls are needed to make the front legs.



Roll a ball into a little sausage shape.

Attach a little ball of white clay to one end to make the cat's paw.



Attach the paw to your cat's body.

You can use the cocktail stick to mark in the cat's toes.



Attach the other front leg to your cat in the same way.

Use two small balls of white and caramel clay to make the back paws.



Attach the first paw and use the cocktail stick to mark out the toes.



Do the same again and attach the other paw.

Now you will need one more ball of caramel and white clay to make the cat's tail.



Roll the caramel and white clay into sausage shapes.

Then join them together.



Attach the tail to your cat!



Using the cocktail stick you can make marks for the cat's fur.



Using some fine fuse wire, you can make some whiskers for your cat.



Whiskers!

Now he needs to be baked in the oven to harden him.

Follow the instructions on the Sculpey packet for oven timing and temperature.



Just out of the oven.

Have fun!



How to make a Mouse with Sculpey clay

You will need pink and grey Sculpey clay.

Two small beads.

A cocktail stick or clay modeling tools, if you have them.



Shape one of the grey balls of clay into a mouse head, as shown in the picture.



Flatten two grey balls into little ear shapes.




Flatten two pink balls to make the insides of the ears.



Attach ears to the back of the head of your mouse.



Get the beads ready to make the eyes.



Press them into the clay with the cocktail stick.



Make a little pink ball for the nose.



Pop the nose into position and use the cocktail stick to make the nostril holes.



Use the cocktail stick to sculpt a mouth.



Roll out the larger ball of grey clay for the body.



Attach the head and press gently onto the body.



Flatten two grey balls to make the back legs.



Attach the back legs by pressing gently into position.



And the same for the other leg.



Roll a sausage shape for the first front leg.



Attach a blob of pink clay for the paw.

Use the cocktail stick to mark the feet.



Do the same again for the other front leg.



Use a flattened blob of pink clay to make the first back foot.


Mark out the toes with the cocktail stick.



Roll out a pink sausage shape for the tail.



Attach the tail.



Position the tail how you want it to look on your mouse.



Now he's ready to be baked hard in the oven.


